PE and Sport Premium Funding Strategy 2023-24

Our PE and Sport Premium funding confirmed in September 2023 was £18,865 = £58.77p per child

Aims of the PE and Sport Premium Fund

The Department for Education and the Education and Skills Funding agency state that:

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. This means they should use the premium to:

- Develop or add to the PE and sports activities that your school already offers
- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Primary PE and Sport Premium key indicators of success:

- 1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity- the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school.
- 2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Funding allocation (Mainstream Schools)

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1 to 6. In cases where schools do not follow year groups (for example, in some special schools), pupils aged 5 to 10 attract the funding. Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil.

In most cases, the Government determine how many pupils in your school attract the funding by using data from the January school census.

Payments

Maintained schools, including PRUs and general hospitals, do not receive funding directly from DfE. The Government gives the funding to Lambeth, who in turn transfer it to us. The Government gives local authorities PE and sport premium funding for maintained schools in 2 separate payments. They receive:

- 7/12 of our funding allocation on 30 October 2020
- 5/12 of your funding allocation on 30 April 2021

Use of funds

Profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement, for example by:

- Actively encourage pupils to take on leadership or volunteer roles that support the delivery of sport and physical activity within the school (such as 'sport leader' or peer-mentoring schemes)
- Embedding physical activity into the school day through encouraging active travel to and from school, active break times and holding active lessons and teaching

Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport, for example by:

- providing staff with professional development, mentoring, appropriate training and resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively to all pupils, and embed physical activity across your school
- hiring qualified sports coaches and PE specialists to work alongside teachers to enhance or extend current opportunities offered to pupils

Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils, for example by:

- introducing a new range of sports and physical activities (such as dance, yoga or fitness sessions) to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- partnering with other schools to run sports and physical activities and clubs
- providing more and broadening the variety of extra-curricular activities after school in the 3 to 6pm window, delivered by the school or other local sports
 organisations

Increased participation in competitive sport, for example by:

- increasing and actively encouraging pupils' participation in the School Games
- organising, coordinating or entering more sport competitions or tournaments within the school or across the local area, including those run by sporting organisations

Accountability and monitoring

As with all government funding, school leaders must be able to account for how this money is being used to achieve our central goal of schools getting back on track and teaching a normal curriculum as quickly as possible.

Given their role in ensuring schools spend funding appropriately and in holding schools to account for educational performance, governors and trustees should scrutinise schools' approaches to Sport and PE from September, including their plans for and use of premium funding.

This should include consideration of whether schools are spending this funding in line with their whole school development priorities, and ensuring appropriate transparency for parents. (<u>DfE guidance - Coronavirus (COVID-19) catch-up premium</u>)
